

About Ordinary Time

The Season after Pentecost is not actually a season with a single common focus, but is simply the weeks between the Day of Pentecost and the First Sunday of Advent. It is often called "Ordinary Time." These weeks hold both the slower pace and peaceful quality of summer months and the quicker pace and flurry of activity in the early fall. These are our "ordinary" days, in which we live the Christian faith in our daily lives.

During these weeks, as the liturgical scholar Leonel Mitchell puts it, we celebrate "the time in which we actually live — the period between the Pentecost and the Second Advent." Two thousand years after the first Pentecost, the church still lives in this "in between" time before the fulfillment of time in Christ's second coming. You might also hear these weeks called "the long, green season," referring both to the green color of the vestments and altar hangings for these weeks as well as to the summertime of year in which many of the weeks fall in the northern hemisphere.

After Pentecost we settle into the growing season, nourishing the seeds planted at Easter and putting down roots in our faith.

The Lessons

From the Hebrew Scriptures

Exodus 16:2-4,9-15

A Reading from the Book of Exodus.

The whole congregation of the Israelites complained against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness. The Israelites said to them, "If only we had died by the hand of the Lord in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the fleshpots and ate our fill of bread; for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger."

Then the Lord said to Moses, "I am going to rain bread from heaven for you, and each day the people shall go out and gather enough for that day. In that way I will test them, whether they will follow my instruction or not."

Then Moses said to Aaron, "Say to the whole congregation of the Israelites, 'Draw near to the Lord, for he has heard your complaining." And as Aaron spoke to the whole congregation of the Israelites, they looked toward the wilderness, and the glory of the Lord appeared in the cloud. The Lord spoke to Moses and said, "I have heard the complaining of the Israelites; say to them, 'At twilight you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have your fill of bread; then you shall know that I am the Lord your God."

In the evening quails came up and covered the camp; and in the morning there was a layer of dew around the camp. When the layer of dew lifted, there on the surface of the wilderness was a fine flaky substance, as fine as frost on the ground. When the Israelites saw it, they said to one another, "What is it?" For they did not know what it was. Moses said to them, "It is the bread that the Lord has given you to eat."

A Reading from the Letter of Paul to the Ephesians.

I therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all. But each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift. Therefore it is said,

"When he ascended on high he made captivity itself a captive; he gave gifts to his people."

(When it says, "He ascended," what does it mean but that he had also descended into the lower parts of the earth? He who descended is the same one who ascended far above all the heavens, so that he might fill all things.) The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ. We must no longer be children, tossed to and fro and blown about by every wind of doctrine, by people's trickery, by their craftiness in deceitful scheming. But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and knit together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love.







The Tuesday night formation group is studying Karen Armstrong's *Twelve Steps to a Compassionate Life*. Armstrong is one of the most original thinkers on the role of religion in the modern world. She is the author of such acclaimed books as A History of God, Islam, and Buddha. Twelve Steps to a Compassionate Life gives us an impassioned and practical book that can help us make the world a more compassionate place.

From the book: "Karen Armstrong believes that while compassion is intrinsic in all human beings, each of us needs to work diligently to cultivate and expand our capacity for compassion. Here, in this straightforward, thoughtful, and thought-provoking book, she sets out a program that can lead us toward a more compassionate life.

"The twelve steps Armstrong suggests begin with "Learn About Compassion" and close with "Love Your Enemies." In between, she takes up "compassion for yourself," mindfulness, suffering, sympathetic joy, the limits of our knowledge of others, and "concern for everybody." She suggests concrete ways of enhancing our compassion and putting it into action in our everyday lives, and provides, as well, a reading list to encourage us to "hear one another's narratives." Throughout, Armstrong makes clear that a compassionate life is not a matter of only heart or mind but a deliberate and often life-altering commingling of the two."

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




GOD'S FAMILY, THE CHURCH, IS LIKE A BODY.



God made us all to be different. But he made us to love each other, and work together to take care of his world. When Jesus fills us with his love, we are like a healthy body that is growing big and strong.

The Bible tells us to grow to be like Jesus. Draw the baby who has just been baptized, growing to be big and strong, like Jesus.



A NOTE TO PARENTS

" ... until we all attain to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to mature humanity, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ ..."

Ephesians 4:13

At the baptism of a child, the celebrant asks the parents and godparents, "Will you by your prayers and witness help this child to grow into the full stature of Christ?" They reply, "I will, with God's help." Later, the entire congregation promises to do all in their power to support the candidates in their life in Christ. These are sweeping promises; at their heart is Paul's conviction that our new life in Christ can only be lived out in community. In the work of creation and redemption, God has showered us with gifts, which bring us into a shared life. There, the very exercise of these gifts, and our thanksgiving for them, enables God to bestow them in ever greater abundance, so that the Body grows stronger, more loving, more faithful ... more able to grow.

Read this passage from Ephesians every day this week: read it with your spouse or your child's godparent or grandparent; find a quiet time and meditate on it. Then read the baptismal promises (Prayer Book, p. 302 - 305) as you look at your child, lying asleep or playing nearby. What do you remember of your child's baptism? Of your own baptism? If your child was too little to remember his or her baptism, have you looked together at photos of the day, or told your child about it? Do you have mementoes, such as a candle, or cards, that your child has seen? Do you remember the day on its anniversary?

There are many good books on baptism for parish adult study: The Baptizing Community by Theodore Eastman; Remember Who You Are: Baptism and the Christian Life by William Willimon; Taking the Plunge: Baptism and Parenting by Anne Kitch; Living Water: Baptism as a Way of Life by Klara Tammany. Are there periodic adult study groups on baptism in your congregation? How faithful is your parish in fostering a sense of the ongoing, transformative power of these promises—and of God's grace through them—in its common life?
